The compulsory subject “Moral Philosophy and Applied Ethics I” is designed to develop thematic contents with which the student obtains a frame of reference of interest for the development of the set of general competencies of the degree of Graduate in Philosophy. - Be familiar with the ideas and arguments of the main philosophers and thinkers, extracted from their texts, and with the investigation of their traditions and schools, identifying the possible androcentric biases.
- Use and rigorously analyse specialised philosophical terminology.
- Relate problems, ideas, schools and traditions.
- Identify and evaluate clearly and rigorously the arguments presented either in texts or orally.
- Work with an increasing degree of self-motivation and self-demand.
- Appreciate autonomy and independence of judgement.
- Be able to take on social and ethical commitments.
- Become aware of the ethical component and deontological principles of professional practice.

## LEARNING OUTCOMES

- To acquire an adequate understanding of the field of moral philosophy and applied ethics and methods used.
- To be able to distinguish different lines of research in the field of moral philosophy and applied ethics.
- To familiarize with the central problems and authors of moral philosophy and applied ethics. At the end of the course, the student will be able to identify some of the central positions on the topics studied.
