**SUMMARY**

Intervention and Psychological Treatment is a core subject of basic training for Degree in Psychology, third year. The student will have the opportunity to acquire basic knowledge, along with other subjects such as Psychology, Social and Community Intervention, also taught in third grade, Psychological Assessment, the second year, and Design Research in Psychology and Psychopathology, to be taught in fourth grade. That training will provide a solid foundation for the development of further training in other Grade electives such as Clinical Psychology, Clinical Child Psychology, Intervention in Educational Contexts, and the external practice training. Also, this course brings its own set of skills essential for professional development in the field of Clinical Psychology and Health, as well as other areas of professional intervention.



## PREVIOUS KNOWLEDGE

6.- Being able to use information resources necessary to guide the search for teaching materials or information about psychological treatments may be needed.

## TEACHING METHODOLOGY

1. Lectures.
2. Reading, discussion and analysis of texts, both of the original authors and later handbooks.
3. Viewing and discussion of videos.
4. Discussion of conceptual and practical issues.



5. Analysis of research reports on specific psychological treatments.
6. Design research on a concrete psychological treatment.
7. Presentation and discussion of cases that have made mistakes and faults ethics in psychological treatments.
8. Discussion of concepts and role play a therapy sessions.
9. A case analysis from various psychological approaches.

11. Presentations by students on non-contact work.

## EVALUATION

Minimum requirements to pass the subject: The mark to pass the subject is 5 (out of 10).

In order to be able to pass the subject, a 5 score in the exam (or its corresponding consideration) in the official exam must be obtained. Following the regulations of the University of Valencia, approved by the Governing Council on May 30, 2017 (ACGUV 1.08/2017), the overall evaluation of the student can be obtained as a result of the combination of the assessment obtained in the final exam along with that achieved in the different continuous assessment activities carried out. These activities can be practical and carried out in the class or individually, texts reading and report's elaboration, group or individual works with their corresponding reports, oral presentation, etc. The teacher responsible for the subject will record in the agenda, and at the beginning of the course, how the assessment will be organized, as well as the weight and weighing that he considers most appropriate in relation to the subject themes' organization.

Such assessment can not be modified throughout the course. It will be also indicated what activities and themes can be re-assessed and how will be done, in each of the official announcements of the subject. Other questions related to the final qualification: The final qualification and the award of the excellent with distinction will be based, basically, on the exam grades and according to the University of Valencia norms, which take into account the number of excellent with distinction per group. The teacher will indicate whether, in addition to this consideration and in view of the development and fulfillment of the course agenda, it will be taken into account the group's work and activities, attendance and participation in class, as well as attendance to tutoring sessions, or attendance at the oral exposures exhibited by the students.

The exams will be written, with choice questions and may include the resolution of practical cases. The teacher may consider carrying out a development examination for the granting of an excellent with distinction. This information should appear in the agenda of the course prepared by each teacher and communicated to the students at the beginning of the subject.

The qualification of the subject will abide to what is stipulated in the Reglament d'Avaluació i Qualificació de la Universitat de València per a títols de Grau i Màster (ACGUV 108/2017 of May 30, 2017).
