LEARNING OUTCOMES

The acquisition of this information and the process employed to achieve it will be instruments for developing not only reading comprehension skills but also critical thinking and reasoned opinions.

Study of the topics must enable merely descriptive and diachronic visions to be overcome. Students must become aware of the relationship between past and present and become familiar with multi-causal reasoning and comparative perspectives.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

CLASSES

The classes will combine theoretical explanations of the course contents with practical analyses and commentaries on various materials, including texts, maps and documents. All activities are intended to encourage student participation.

PREPARATION FOR THEORY CLASSES

The teacher will inform students about which readings they should consult in order to prepare for these classes.

PREPARATION FOR PRACTICAL WORK

The teacher will set the guidelines for carrying out practical work in the relevant Annex as well as in class or in the virtual classroom throughout the course.

TUTORIALS

Students may consult their teachers during office hours on any aspect related to their classes, assignments and readings.

EVALUATION

Students will be evaluated according to the following procedure:

1. A final exam on a date set by the centre in order to evaluate the student's knowledge of the subject, written expression (terminology and discourse), and ability to relate and reason. This final exam will account for 60% of the student's final grade.



2. Tests, activities and exercises set by the teachers in the Annex and conducted during the course. These will account for 40% of the final grade. Students who commit plagiarism (copying from books, papers, and the Internet, etc. without citing the sources) will be given a fail (0 grade) in this course.

The second exam call will comprise the following procedure:

- 1. A final exam on the date set by the centre. This exam will include all the topics included in the course. As with the first call, the exam in the second call will account for 60% of the final grade.
- 2. The grades students have been awarded for their assignments during the course will be maintained at the second call and will again account for 40% of the final grade. These grades will remain in effect only for the current academic year.

SEMI-PRESENTIAL TEACHING

1. Contents

The contents initially included in the teaching guide are maintained.

2. Workload and time schedule



The activities and their hours of dedication in ECTS credits marked in the original course guide will be kept. If the capacity of the classrooms derived from the sanitary conditions does not allow 100% attendance, the theoretical classes will have an attendance of 50%, with the rotation by alternate weeks of the students divided into two subgroups. Supplementary activities (weekly hour P: total 15 h.) won't have class attendance and will be preferentially online. Teaching planning will be specified at the beginning of the term.

If the sanitary situation changes and no access to the University facilities is possible, all teaching activities will be carried out completely online. In this case, the adaptations will be communicated to the students through the Virtual classroom.

3. Teaching Methodology

Theory and practice classes with attendance of 50% with the rotation by alternate weeks of the students divided into two subgroups (if the capacity of the classrooms derived from the sanitary conditions doesn't allow 100% attendance) which, according to the teacher's planning and technical availability, may be followed on the other 50% by synchronous videoconference through the Blackboard Collaborate platform or similar. They will be complemented with different types of materials and activities in the Virtual classroom.

Tutorials will be done online (through the UV corporate mail) or face-to-face by prior appointment with the teacher.

If the sanitary situation changes and no access to the University facilities is possible, teaching and tutorials will be carried out completely online. In this case, the adaptations will be communicated to the students through the Virtual classroom.

4. Evaluation

The evaluation criteria established in the Course Guide are kept.

If the University facilities were closed on the dates set in the official calendar for the final exam, the face-to-face exam will be replaced by an online test. In this case, the adaptations will be communicated to the students through the Virtual classroom.

5. Bibliographic references



The recommended bibliography in the Course Guide is kept. If the sanitary situation changes and the access to the recommended bibliography is not possible, it will be replaced by materials accessible online.
