TEACHING METHODOLOGY

A. Three hours of classroom sessions per week

These comprise:

- 1) Subject-matter lectures imparted by the assigned lecturers (30 hours/course)

Two hours per week are dedicated to theory-based lectures. Lectures cover the essential content of the course in a systematic manner and relevant bibliography is suggested for further study.



2) Practice-based lessons (15 hours/course)

One hour a week is dedicated to practical excercises. The aim is to acquire the competence to understand and analyze the texts and published papers and articles that are suggested in the bibliography.

B. Seminars and supplementary activities

Compulsory attendance to a course-related supplementary events: visits to museums, exhibitions, conferences and/or monographic seminars. A written summary of the activity will be handed in and graded. Guidelines will be laid out and made clear before the activity takes place.

C. Unshdeduled tutorials

Unscheduled tutorials are optional. Students can meet with tutors at prescribed tutorial-hours. Their purpose is to clarify aspects related to the course.

D. Scheduled tutorials

Scheduled tutorials are optional. They are set outside teaching hours and are programed by the tutor. Their purpose is to expand theoretical-practical issues related to the subject matter.

EVALUATION

The final grade comprises:

1. A mid-term follow-up test based on excercises and text reviews that have been worked on during the practice-based, coursework assignments. Active participation and debate in the practical sessions is positively assessed and the written assignments are graded.
2. Attendance to seminars or suggested events and a written assessment paper on the activity. There is also a follow-up test on the suggested reading activity of a relevant text pertaining to the course.
3. The final exam will grade the acquired theoretical knowledge on the course contents and their practical application to the subject matter. A minimum mark of 4 points (out of ten) in the final exam is required in order to obtain the overall grade, which is averaged together with the mid-term tests, written assignments and course activities.

The precise weight of each assessment toward the final grade is:

Final written exam: 60- 50%

Reading test and supplementary activities: 30-20%

Written assignments: 20-10%

TOTAL 100%



The re-sit examination: Should the student pass the Reading test, the Supplementary activity and/or the Written assignment and fail to pass the final written exam, he/she will have another opportunity to resit the final exam, while keeping the partial assessment grades of each of the other parts. Supplementary activities are non recoverable in the second examination session.

Excepting Erasmus students, grammar and spelling mistakes will score negatively on the qualification of all written tests and academic works. Their accumulation may lead to a failing grade in the course.

PRESENTIAL / SEMI-PRESENTIAL TEACHING

1. Contents

The contents initially included in the teaching guide are maintained

2. Workload and time schedule

The activities and their hours of dedication in ECTS credits marked in the original course guide will be kept. If the classrooms capacity according to the sanitary norms allows it, the theoretical class attendance will be 100% (if the capacity couldn't be guaranteed, the class attendance would be reduced). Supplementary activities (weekly hour P: total 15 h.) won't have class attendance and will be preferentially online. Teaching planning will be specified at the beginning of the term.

If the sanitary situation changes and no access to the University facilities is possible, all teaching activities will be carried out completely online. In this case, the adaptations will be communicated to the students through the Virtual classroom.

3. Teaching Methodology

Theory and practice classes that may be complemented with different types of materials and activities in the Virtual classroom.

Tutorials will be done online (through the UV corporate mail) or face-to-face by prior appointment with the teacher.

If the sanitary situation changes and no access to the University facilities is possible, teaching and tutorials will be carried out completely online. In this case, the adaptations will be communicated to the students through the Virtual classroom.

4. Evaluation

The evaluation criteria established in the Course Guide are kept.
