SUMMARY

This course examines Latin American art from the time of the Spanish conquest to the beginning of the independence movement. This artistic period is studied by analysing the manifestations of artistic expression chronologically. We begin with an introduction to the process of acculturation and evangelization which led to the generation of useful art both for instructional purposes and control of the territory. This general framework will then allow us to study the architectural, sculptural, pictorial and silverware creations of the colonial period. A special section, the depth of which is justified by its capacity to bring together and summarize the artistic efforts of three centuries of Latin American art, involves the study of several cathedrals as major construction milestones.

CONTACT SESSIONS Classroom attendance PREPARATION OF THEORY CLASSES These classes will be conducted using materials provided by the teacher or obtained by the students. TUTORIALS a) No tutorials will be scheduled. b) A number of non-scheduled tutorials will be arranged in order to provide assistance and satisfy teaching requirements. COMPLEMENTARY ACTIVITIES Students will do readings based on course contents and make a presentation.

EVALUATION

2. Workload and time schedule
