TEACHING METHODOLOGY

A) Attendance to classes: in the classroom, the teacher will present and explain those fundamental elements that should guide the student in the study and understanding of the specific subject, using the appropriate means for it (theoretical classes, projection of images through Power Point presentations and / or videos, etc.).



B) **Preparation of theoretical classes**: it is essential that the student carry out, prior to the presentation of the teacher and each topic, a reading of the manual or of the texts previously indicated.

C) **Preparation of practical task**: the practical component aims to deep in, through various materials, those aspects that are considered most important or significant for the subject. The materials will be provided by the teacher to the students and the relevant prior preparation for the activity will be indicated, where appropriate. This practical section includes the reading of a literary work referring to any of the cultures contemplated and which will be set by the teacher of each group at the beginning of the course.

D) **Tutorials:** students will be able to attend the hours of attention to students that each teacher has established, to make inquiries about any topic or aspect related to the subject. The teachers will promptly inform of their respective tutoring schedules.

E) **Supplementary activities:** students will attend different activities organized either by the Faculty of Geography and History, or by each of the teachers responsible for each group. The nature of these activities, dates of completion and evaluation system will be communicated in advance.

EVALUATION

- 1. Written exam, in which both the exposition of the theoretical knowledge acquired and its practical application will be assessed. The grade obtained in this test will represent 60% of the final grade for the course, as long as a minimum grade of 4 (out of 10) is obtained.
- 2. Test of the practical classes, which will be carried out from the exercises and comments on texts carried out in the practical classes, as well as the reading tests and comments on the literary works that have to be delivered to the teacher. The grade obtained in this section will represent 20% of the final grade for the course.
- 3. Supplementary activities assistance. A report about them will have to be submitted for final evaluation. The grade obtained in this section will be 20% of the final grade for the course.

In the second call, only a written test will be carried out, although the grades obtained during the course in the assignments, reading tests and supplementary activities will be taken into account. That qualifications will not remain in force during the following course or courses.

The problems of spelling, syntax and / or written expression will score negatively in the qualification of all the written tests and their accumulation can suppose the failure in the subject.
