## **EVALUATION**

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The final evaluation will be the result of the different tests and activities along the course:

- a) A final theoretical exam with questions related to the subject and the recommended readings.
- b) Practical activities, which will be evaluated along the course.
- c) Attendance and active participation in classes and other activities.

In summary:

Final exam - 60%

Controls of content assimilation or practical works (maximum of 2, in total) - 30%

Complementary activities (attendance and presentation of the corresponding reports) - 10%



Note: A minimum score of 4 points will be required in the exam, in order to incorporate the qualification of the rest of the activities.

The marks of the complementary activities will be kept for the second call of the same academic year.

Excepting Erasmus students, grammar and spelling mistakes will score negatively on the qualification of all written tests and academic works. Their accumulation may lead to a failing grade in the course.
