Comprehend the great contemporary religions, their links with States, the presence of religion in political thought, as well as the relations between religion and politics from different perspectives: historical and territorial, cultural (values) and behavioral and political conflict. Its objective is to facilitate the instruments to understand and analyze the relationship between politics and religion in contemporary societies, in their different facets and dimensions.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

ADDENDUM COVID-19

This addendum will only be activated if the health situation requires so and with the prior agreement of the Governing Council

This subject will be adapted to the MODEL OF HYBRID DOCENCE established by the Facultat de Law, by which will teach theoretical-practical face-to-face classes in alternate weeks. To do this, the group will be partitioned into two subgroups that will receive face-to-face teaching in alternate weeks (even or odd), combined with non-face-to-face teaching. This hybrid model of teaching requires the total presence of the teachers, who will teach in the classroom, at the schedule established for the subject, every week.

For students, in the week of non-in-personity, teaching may be synchronous or asynchronous. For this purpose, different possibilities may be possible:

- provide FOR AUTONOMOUS WORK of students, which can be of a THEORETICAL or PRACTICAL nature, proposed through teaching videos -Kaltura-, annotated PPTs, schematics, written materials, guided readings, etc.;
- either the study can be tracked through VIDEOCONFERENCING through the devices available in the classroom (cameras and/or microphones) or by making use of the portable devices available to the teachers. If the class cannot be broadcast synchronously by videoconference, it could be recorded and the link uploaded to Virtual Classroom, so that the group of students who do not have to attend the classroom can view it remotely at any time of the week.
