TEACHING METHODOLOGY

Theory-and practical classes: developing competences CG02, CG03, CG04, CB1, CB2, CB4, CB5. Lectures will focus on discussion of key concepts and techniques in English linguistics rather than on exposition of matter students can find in the bibliography.

Also, at a more practical level, the study of cases where students develop awareness of proper use of academic English (developing competences CE02, CE11, CE55, CE58).



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Tutorials: orientation in preparing papers, projects or oral presentations in relation to English linguistics (developing competence CE07, CE08, CT01)

EVALUATION

The assessment of competences and learning outcomes will consist of:

FIRST CALL:

40 % – Papers, projects and/or oral presentations, to evaluate students' output —individually or in groups—as regards research for bibliography and information, organization of concepts, argumentation and writing skills, originality and relevance, as well as their management of delivery terms. Active involvement of students in the course will be taken into account.

60 % – Final exam.

SECOND CALL: The 40% corresponding to papers, projects and/or oral presentations, etc. is carried over to the second call. These activities (part B) can only be done during the course and cannot be handed in for the second call. The 60 % consists in a final exam.

The ability to communicate at the C1 (CEFR level) is required to pass the course as a whole. Students whose communication (written and/or oral) displays errors that are not consistent with the above level will fail the module regardless of their performance related to the course contents.

IMPORTANT: Plagiarism is a serious academic offence and will be penalized.

Intellectual honesty is vital to an academic community and for the fair evaluation of the student's work. All work submitted in this course must be originally authored by every student. No student shall engage in unauthorized collaboration or make use of ChatGPT or other AI composition software.
