## LEARNING OUTCOMES (RD 1393/2007) // NO CONTENT (RD 822/2021)

As this course is aimed at providing basic philological strategies and tools to the students, required for a better understanding of the Greek philosophical texts of the Classical Antiquity and later periods, we propose a basic training in Greek language. Here, the student should learn basic philosophical terms originated in the Greek language; read Greek texts in their original form; and identify those specific terms related to the field of Philosophy.

## TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The subject will be divided into two parts: theoretical classes and practical classes. Topics 1, 2 and 3 will be worked on during the practical classes, whereas topics 4 and 5 will be explained in the theoretical classes. Both theoretical and practical classes will start with careful reading and commenting on texts, in Greek or in translation showing a philosophical use of the Greek language.

### Theoretical classes

The development of the theoretical classes, besides being centered on the explanation of the fundamentals of the Greek language, will be reinforced by reading and commenting on texts of Greek authors. In these readings and comments, special account will be taken into the philosophical lexicon of Greek origin. The connection of this lexicon with the author's and/or its cultural context e is considered fundamental to the understanding of Greek culture in general and of Greek philosophy in particular.

### Practical classes

In the practical classes, basic exercises of Greek language will be carried out, so students may obtain a minimum knowledge of Greek allowing them to face Greek texts of low difficulty. After explaining basic grammatical aspects, the classes will be focused on translations and analysis of Greek sentences of gradual and increasing difficulty. Particular attention will be paid to Greek terms related to the field of Ancient Philosophy. No previous knowledge of Greek is necessary.

## EVALUATION

- 1) Submission of an individual or cooperative work indicated by the teacher at the beginning of the course on activities or readings related to the subject. The delivery of the works will be scheduled at the beginning of the course. Works will be submitted through the "Aula Virtual". (30%)
- 2) Final written exam of the subject on the official date, if possible. Otherwise there will be a written work that must be submitted by the official date of the exam. (70%)

To pass the overall subject, it will be necessary to obtain a minimum score of 40% of the total assigned to each of the two aforementioned sections, and to each part of the proof. In addition, the submission of all the tasks will be mandatory in order to be evaluated. Additionally, the active participation of the students in the classes will be rewarded, especially in the practical classes, as well as their active and coherent participation in the tutoring program or attendance at seminars, scientific conferences ... proposed by the teacher. The final grade may be increased up to 1 point.

## ADDENDUM COVID-19

**This addendum will only be activated if the health situation requires so and with the prior agreement of the Governing Council**

1. Hybrid teaching mode: Face-to-face / synchronous with Blackboard Collaborate: simultaneously for all the students in the group, both those who are in the classroom and those who stay at home.

2. Non-face-to-face teaching modality: structured classes through videos, readings and materials with exercises deposited in the “Aula Virtual” by the teacher.
