SUMMARY

This course intends to develop in a monographic and detailed way different problems that constitute the field of Philosophical Anthropology. It should be noted that its place in the curriculum is later than the two subjects "Anthropology I" and "Anthropology II". This allows to deepen in particular aspects that will only have been circumscribed and enunciated in these two previous modules. Canonical matters that can be treated in a more or less monographic way according to the courses and programs are theories of human nature, collective identities (the theories of ethnicity and nationhood), collective identities, multiculturalism and interculturality, analysis of the logic of non-scientific belief systems (magic and religion), anthropology of religion, culture and mass culture historical memory and moral imagination, analysis of the ontological and epistemological assumptions of the various theories and schools of sociocultural anthropology, analysis of the different conceptions of the human and their categorizations in the arts, literature and the various scientific theories of nature, etc.

DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

1. Cultural pessimism the critique of technification in the light of "The Century of Catastrophe"

The course will consist of two related aspects. On the one hand, the genesis and contrast between the French concept of "civilisation" and the German concept of "Kultur". On the other hand, we will see how World War I was later conceived as a "crisis of civilization" or "a civilizing bankruptcy" that activated the critique of the concept of progress (implied in that of "civilization") through a critique of the technification of societies revealed by that war. From this point of view, the center of the study will be constituted by some early philosophical texts, also of cultural criticism, from the first third of the 20th century (the interwar period), focusing on the reflection on the experience of war and terror as phenomena whose analysis also served as a thread to highlight structural and political features of both advanced societies and contemporary wars. Furthermore, as a related matter, we will see how some very current reflections were initiated on the forms of social mourning that go beyond the literary inscription of that traumatic experience.

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TEACHING METHODOLOGY

PRESENTIAL CLASSES: There will be 2 hours a week of theoretical classes, taught by the lecturer, in which students can participate.

THEORETICAL CLASSES PREPARATION: Students must attend the theoretical classes having read the material that the lecturer has recommended for each session.

PRACTICAL WORK PREPARATION AND CARRYING OUT TEAM WORK: Throughout the module, students will have to prepare at least one essay under the direction and supervision of the lecturer.

TUTORIALS: There will be two types of tutorials, some scheduled for the preparation and supervision of practical work and others for consultations.

COMPLEMENTARY ACTIVITIES: The lecturer will indicate to the students throughout the course in which activities inside and outside the Faculty they must participate (among which will be included the Conference of the Josep Lluís Blasco Philosophy and Citizenship Chair or others that are scheduled in the faculty).

EVALUATION

First call:

The evaluation will be done through a final written test and a series of continuous assessment activities (written work, presentations and classroom exercises) that will take place during the course. The final written test and the activities proposed in the theoretical classes will determine 70% of the final mark, while the activities proposed in the practical classes will determine the remaining 30%. In order to pass the course, it is necessary to obtain a grade of 5 out of ten or more in the final written test.

Second call:

The evaluation will be done through a final written test on the whole subject that will determine 100% of the final mark.
