**SUMMARY**

This subject, of a theoretical-practical nature, is the first of a series of six that make up the Italian Language subject. It provides an introduction to knowledge of the basic structures of the Italian language and, therefore, to students' basic and fundamental mastery of language skills. More specifically, it is aimed at acquiring level A1 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR).

### Relationship to other subjects of the same degree

There are no specified enrollment restrictions with other subjects of the curriculum.

### Other requirements

Taking into account that the students who enrol on this course have not had the opportunity to study the Italian language before, no prior knowledge of the language and its grammar is required. This is why we start from basic linguistic questions which are expanded throughout the course so that the student gradually and progressively learns the fundamental linguistic notions and acquires the basic skills for the knowledge and use of the Italian language according to the level.

## OUTCOMES

## LEARNING OUTCOMES

The level to be achieved after completion of the course (CEFR LEVEL A1) will ensure that the learner will be able to understand and use familiar everyday expressions and simple sentences aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type. Can introduce him/herself and others, ask for and give basic personal information about home, personal possessions and people known to him/her. Can interact in a basic way provided the other person talks slowly and clearly and is prepared to cooperate.

## DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

### 1. Basics of grammar

Subject pronoun. Distinction between "tu" and "Lei".

Indeterminate and determinate articles.

Formation of gender (masculine and feminine) and number (singular and plural) of nouns and adjectives.

Agreement between article, noun and adjective.

Negation of sentence: "no" and negation of verb: "non".

Present indicative: "essere, avere, piacere". Regular, irregular and reflexive verbs. Introduction to modal verbs: "potere, volere, dovere".



Imperative (introduction).

"Passato prossimo". Past participle.

Possessive adjectives.

Adverbs of frequency: "sempre, spesso, di solito, qualche volta".

Interrogative pronouns (introduction): "come, dove, che, quanto, chi, perché".

Prepositions: "di, a, da, in, su, con, per" and "preposizioni articolate".

Partitive: "di".

Connectors: "e, o, ma, allora, prima, poi, invece, quando, perché, quindi".

## 2. Basic vocabulary

- Courtesy formulas.
- Different types of tourist accommodation. Public buildings and spaces. Opening hours of public services.
- Leisure and sport. Daily actions. Family organisation.
- Meals: customs and traditions. Some typical Italian dishes. Food and festivals.
- Geography of Italy.

## TEACHING METHODOLOGY

As this is a theoretical-practical subject, there is no strict methodological separation between theory and practice.

In the classes, the fundamentals of the Italian language will be explained. They will be developed according to the interactive/communicative didactic model, encouraging the students' conversation among themselves and with the teacher, based on concrete situations of communication.

Different types of exercises will be carried out to consolidate the skills acquired and to deepen the assimilation of grammatical content.

The linguistic reflection of the students will be encouraged through the continuous contrast between Italian and the students' mother tongue and the other languages studied at the Faculty of Philology, Translation and Communication.



In class, the texts specified in the basic bibliography will be used, as well as additional material that the teacher will make available to the students throughout the course.

The readings selected by the teacher will help students to acquire lexis and the structures and modes of expression that are fundamental for the mastery of a language.

New technologies will also be used to promote the learning of the Italian language.

## EVALUATION

The evaluation shall consist of three parts:

- a) Individual written examination 55%
- b) Oral examination 20%
- c) Active participation, continuous assessment and written/oral activities 25%

Specifically, the following will be assessed:

1.- Active participation and involvement of students in face-to-face activities: attendance and participation in class, completion of exercises and assignments sent in class or through the virtual classroom, attendance (if applicable) to scheduled tutorials, as well as to the activities carried out by the UD of Italian, the Dept. of French and Italian Philology, the FFTiC or other entities dedicated to the dissemination of Italian language and literature.

The exercises and assignments proposed for both classroom and non-classroom hours must be completed and/or handed in in due time and form. They will not be accepted outside the established timetable.

2.- Adequacy and correctness of the written/oral activities (point c).

3.- Adequacy and correctness of the final overall exam, which will assess knowledge and the different skills: grammar and vocabulary, written comprehension, written expression, oral comprehension and oral expression (points a-b). **In order to pass the final written exam, it is necessary to achieve at least a pass mark (5) in each of its parts: grammar and vocabulary, written comprehension, oral comprehension and written expression.** Exceptionally, if in one and only one of the parts a mark lower than 5 and higher than 4 is achieved, this mark will be averaged with the rest of the parts.

The oral production test will consist of a short conversation with the teacher based on the content worked on in class and the compulsory reading; in any case, it will be kept within the level expected at the end of the course (level A1 of the CEFR).

In order to pass the course as a whole, it is necessary to achieve at least a pass mark (5) in each of the sections. If this is not the case, the student will keep the tests, reports or exercises passed until the second exam session.



**Details of the assessment will be clarified at the beginning of the course.**

**All activities, both written and oral, will be carried out in Italian and, for this purpose, the average level of the students will be taken into account, as well as the European reference framework in which the subject is included.**

**Italian mother tongue students should contact the teacher to agree on the forms of assessment.**

**The teacher will not reply to e-mails requesting public information (either from the DG or from the degree).**

**The lecturer will not reply to e-mails that arrive from non-UV e-mail addresses (i.e. different from the extension "alumni.uv.es") and that are not correctly identified and signed.**

**Intellectual honesty is vital to an academic community and for the fair evaluation of the student's work. All work submitted in this course must be originally authored by every student.
