This course consists of two parts: discourse analysis and German dialectology. Language of instruction and assessment will be German.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

Theoretical-practical classes:

Presentation of concepts and topics by expository method; application of theory to practical cases, debates, group work and exhibition of work carried out; activities in Aula virtual.

EVALUATION

The subject has two different thematic blocks (discourse analysis and dialectology) which will be assessed independently. The grading will be continuous in both thematic blocks.

The final grade will be obtained as the average of the grades of the blocks, the note of Gesprächsanalyse weighing 30%, Dialektologie 70%. In order for the average to be obtained, none of the marks in any of the blocks may be less than 4.

Each of the blocks will be graded in the following way:

- Handing in homework (20%)
- Activities in class and in Aula Virtual (40%)
- Final written exam (40%)

The first exam for Gesprächsanalyse will be on Monday, October 16.

For the second exam, the results of the different activities (homework, Virtual Classroom activities) obtained during the four-month period are maintained. Only the final exams are recoverable.
