SUMMARY

German Language 2 is a subject in the second year of the German minor/language C, aimed at students who have previously taken German Language 1. The aim is for students to strengthen and develop their communicative competence in the German language, so that their ability to act in German is reinforced.

Throughout the course, students will strengthen their receptive and productive skills so that they will be able to deal with increasingly complex communicative situations, while broadening their cultural knowledge of German-speaking countries.

In this subject the student's self-learning will be encouraged; the effort to put into practice the lexical, grammatical and communicative knowledge acquired will be strengthened. At the same time, students will be motivated to continue consolidating their competence in the language.

In this subject the use of information and communication technologies (ICT) will be habitual and constant. Students should consult their University email account regularly and frequently, as they will receive official notifications from the University Secretary's Office and news relevant to this subject from the lecturer. To contact the lecturer by e-mail, the student must use the account provided by the University (of the type@alumni.uv.es) and the subject of the message must include the purpose of the communication.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

1.- Classroom-based training activities: 40% of the workload (60 hours):

Theoretical-practical classes: presentation of the concepts and analysis procedures associated with phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, lexicon and semantics of the language by means of the expository method; practical application of the concepts presented in the theoretical parts and development of communicative skills by means of individual or group work.

2.- Non-face-to-face training activities: 60% of the workload (90 hours):

Study, individual or group work and exercises, tutorials, preparation of continuous assessment tests, preparation and taking, if necessary, final exams.



IMPORTANT NOTE: Given that the progression of German language learning during the Degree is very rapid, it is essential that the student uses the 90 hours of independent work mentioned in the previous point to reinforce the content taught in class and consolidate the knowledge acquired. To this end, they can make use of the many proposals made available by the subject teacher and other methods that they consider appropriate.

EVALUATION

Two different assessments are offered:

ITINERARY 1

The activities to be assessed during the four-month period consist of the following:

- 1 individual video (5%)
- 1 written production in class (10%)
- 1 project (group work) (10%)
- Activities in class and in Aula Virtual (15%)

Final exams:

- Final written exam (40%)
- Oral exam (20%)

The final written exam consists of two parts: The first part covers listening comprehension, reading comprehension, grammar and vocabulary. A minimum mark of 5 out of 10 must be obtained in this part. If this is not achieved, the second part, which consists of a written production, will not be corrected.

At the beginning of the semester, a compulsory reading will be announced which will be part of the written exam.



For the second date of examination, there is no recovery of any evaluable activity, except for the final written exam and the oral exam.

In order to take the oral exam it is necessary to have passed the final written exam with a minimum mark of 5 out of 10.

In order to pass the course, it is compulsory to pass the oral exam. The oral exam will be recorded.

ITINERARY 2

The activities to be assessed during the four-month period consist of the following:

- 1 individual video (5%)
- 1 project (group work) (10%)

Final exams:

- Final written exam (50%)
- Oral exam (35%)

At the beginning of the semester, compulsory reading will be announced which will be part of the written exam.

For the second date of examination, there is no recovery of any evaluable activity, except for the final written exam and the oral exam.

In order to take the oral exam it is necessary to have passed the final written exam with a minimum mark of 5 out of 10.

In order to pass the course, it is compulsory to pass the oral exam. The oral exam will be recorded.
