SUMMARY

Minor course in "Portuguese Language and its Literatures" (6 ECTS credits, 4th year, 1st four-month period).

1. Development of communication skills in the Portuguese language (oral and written comprehension, expression oral and written). CEFR level B1.

2. Grammar of the Portuguese language: phonetics and phonology, morphology, syntax, lexicon and semantics. Will deepen the study of grammar as communication skills develop. CEFR level B1.

DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

1. Ideal vacation

Communication objectives: describe places; talk about travel; talk about different types of vacations; talk about past vacations; express desire; formulate hypotheses; imagine unreal situations; write an informal letter.

Lexical contents: activities and objects associated with vacations; travel itineraries.

Grammatical contents: imperfect indicative tense.

2. Summer festivals

Communicative objectives: talk about Portuguese singers and musical groups; talk about actions started or repeated in the past that continue to the present.

Lexical contents: types of music, musical instruments and professions related to music.

Grammatical contents: regular and irregular past participles; past perfect composed of indicative; past perfect simple vs. past perfect compound indicative; past perfect simple vs. past perfect compound indicative; adverbs and adverbial locutions.

3. Television: pros and cons

Communication objectives: identify television programs; read, analyze and search for information on television programs; consider the advantages and disadvantages of television; expose an idea; argue and counter-argue; express a past action prior to another also past.

Lexical contents: vocabulary related to television.

Grammatical contents: pluperfect past tense composed of indicative; connectors to establish temporal relationships and to express opinion and conclusion..

4. Cinema and literature

Communicative objectives: talk about cinema and films; present a critical opinion about a film and/or a book; understand a synopsis; write a synopsis.

Lexical contents: professions and film genres; books and their authors.

Grammatical contents: variable and invariable relative pronouns.



5. Fashion and its stars

Communicative objectives: talk about fashion and the daily life of its protagonists; ask for and give advice, suggestions and authorization; write about fashion.

Lexical contents: vocabulary related to fashion.

Grammatical contents: imperative mood.

6. Idols

Communication objectives: talk about issues related to youth; refer to other people's words using direct and indirect speech; transmit messages and personal messages.

Lexical contents: vocabulary related to the world of journalism.

Grammatical contents: direct and indirect style; introductory verbs of reported speech.

7. A trip to the future

Communication objectives: Request and transmit opinions on new technologies; talk about future actions and events; talk about imaginary actions in the future; make forecasts; express different degrees of probability; formulate real, probable and possible hypotheses; express purpose and causality.

Lexical contents: vocabulary related to new technologies.

Grammatical contents: future imperfect of the indicative; adverbs and adverbial locutions of the future, adverbs of time; adverbs of doubt and temporal expressions; personal and impersonal infinitive; prepositions and prepositive phrases.

8. Environment

Communication objectives: identify environmental problems and talk about their causes and consequences; write a news.

Lexical contents: nature; environmental problems and challenges; idiomatic expressions.

Grammatical contents: passive voice.



9. The feelings

Communicative objectives: talk about friendships and companionship; talk about actions of improbable realization; ask for and offer advice and suggestions; express wishes; place orders delicately; express doubt or uncertainty about past events; express surprise and indignation.

Lexical contents: vocabulary related to feelings.

Grammatical contents: conditional.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

Teaching manual: Ferreira, Ana Maria Bayan and Bayan, Helena José. *Na Onda do Português 2*, Lisbon-Porto, Lidel, 2011.

The face-to-face teaching consists of four weekly sessions that combine theoretical explanations with oral and written practice,

which will complement and reinforce the theoretical classes. A strict methodological separation between theory and practice will

not be established. The theoretical descriptions are aimed at developing and strengthening the practice of the four skills.

Theoretical-practical classes:

Grammatical explanations on each of the topics of the program, following the development specified for each one of them



in the agenda. The teacher will expose the essential contents and explain the way in which they should be approached by the

student.

The practical part is aimed at developing relevant linguistic and communication skills and oral and written comprehension of the

Portuguese language through appropriate exercises in this regard.

In many cases, the student will previously prepare the exercises, which will be corrected and explained in class.

Other activities:

Tutorials

To resolve doubts that may arise both in theoretical and practical classes, as well as to guide the understanding of the

readings done in class or in carrying out other activities related to the course contents.

EVALUATION

The evaluation will consist of three different parts (1st and 2nd call):

Evaluation type % of final

- a) Individual written exam 60%
- b) Individual oral exam 20%
- c) Attendance, participation and personal work 20%

The note obtained in part C will be valid for both calls.

The written exam will consist of questions about the contents specified in the syllabus and exercises similar to those explained



and carried out in class.

An evaluation of all communication skills will be carried out.

The oral exam will consist of 2 parts:

1st Part: It will be carried out in pairs and will consist of a simulation of a communicative situation, based on previous

indications given by the teacher;

2nd Part: Individually, each student must develop 1 topic (selected at random) from those proposed in the program/manual

"Na Onda do Português 2" and/or make a summary of one of the articles proposed in the "Caderno de Artigos".

Likewise, the teacher can ask the students to demonstrate that they have acquired the lexical and grammatical contents

addressed throughout the semester.

The preferred object of evaluation for the subject "Portuguese Language 3" will be the development of communication skills.

Knowledge of grammar (phonetics and phonology, morphology, syntax, vocabulary and semantics) will be assessed through

tests on the theory or its practical application.

Evaluation criteria

Theory

Acquisition of the grammatical knowledge specified in the subject's agenda.

Practices

Acquisition and development of communication skills in Portuguese (oral and written comprehension and oral and

written expression). Level B1 CEFR.
