TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The methodology to be followed combines three types of activities:

- Theoretical content: the explanation of this type of content will be clearly aimed at its practical application. It will be developed on the basis of explanatory classes given by the teacher with the participation of the students.
- Practical content: this will involve putting the different photojournalistic genres into practice, as well as developing skills in the use of photographic editing software.
- Seminars and workshops: will allow the construction of knowledge through interaction and activity.

EVALUATION

1ST CALL

The final mark for the course will be the sum of the following parts:

Examination of theoretical contents: 30%. Evaluation of individual and/or group work: 60%. Evaluation of the student's participation in class dynamics: 10%. In order for all the elements of the evaluation to be averaged, the student will have to obtain a minimum of 5 out of 10 points in the exam.

2ND CALL

The final mark for the course will be the sum of the following parts:

Theoretical content exam: 40%. Photojournalistic report: 60%. In order for all the elements of the evaluation to be averaged, the student will have to obtain a minimum of 5 out of 10 points in the exam.
