LEARNING OUTCOMES

The student will be able to justify the topic, to elaborate a state of the matter, to search, locate, read, extract and analyze information from documentary and bibliographic sources, under the supervision of his or her tutor, relate it to the knowledge that he or she has acquired in the Master, and prepare an original essay, which will be written according to the canons of the discipline. He or she will orally defend it before a professors commission.

DESCRIPTION OF CONTENTS

1. Contents

The student will elaborate an specialized, individual research work, under the supervision of a professor, about a subject related to the history and the identities of early modern western Mediterranean, in any of the fields studied in the Master. The student must demonstrate that he or she has acquired the necessary skills and knows how to apply the methodological and interpretive resources. The work will be based on documentary and bibliographic sources and must have a minimum length of 50 pages (at 2,100 characters per page).
