SUMMARY

The module 44411 *Research in literature: Diachronic perspectives* is divided into two subjects: *Traditions in Western literature and their reception* and *Break from tradition*. This module is structured on the presentation of the historical stages in the evolution of cultural manifestations, particularly the literary ones, highlighting the phenomena that foster transformations and renovations in the periods covered.

The first subject (*Traditions in Western literature and their reception*) aims at providing a diachronic study of the evolution of Western culture, from the ancient Greco-Roman world to modernity. This approach will rely on the most relevant or paradigmatic texts and authors exemplifying that evolution. The second subject (*Break from tradition*) is devoted to the study of specific literary works, looking into the extent to which those entail continuation of or break from textual tradition.

Other requirements

It is recommended that students have general knowledge of history, literature and the arts.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By reflecting on the concepts of “tradition and break”, this module aims at creating a space of reference and thought that allows for the understanding of this pendular mechanism in the philosophical, cultural and social development applicable to the contexts taken as illustrative framework, as well as different ones. That is, it attempts to encourage the formulation of hypotheses and analytical understanding in analogous phenomena belonging to Western tradition or culturally distanced from it.

These ideas are manifested through the following learning outcomes:

- The application of techniques and methodologies for analysing and interpreting texts from a literary work to study their transmission.
- The application of the appropriate methodologies and techniques for carrying out general research on a literary text, as well as focused research on one of its aspects, either intrinsic or external to the text.
- The application of different techniques and methodologies for analysing and interpreting literary texts.
- The application of knowledge providing a basis for originality (or opportunity to be original) in the development and/or application of ideas, often in a research context.

- 1.2. The reception of Classical culture in the Middle Ages.

2. Tema 2. The break with tradition

- 2.1. The 19th century: between modernity and contemporaneity
- 2.2. Literature and the health crisis: cholera

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The methodology will be structured on the explanation of the contents in class, along with practical examples that will be object of study, and on the materials and documents provided by the teachers. Sessions will consist of the systematic and theoretical presentation of the basic concepts in each unit and their application to specific cases through individual or group exercises.

EVALUATION

Attendance and participation in class and other possible activities will be valued up to 30%, and 70% for the delivery of an individual written work (for one of the two subjects that make up the module). Attendance and participation in at least 80% of the classes is compulsory.

Students must obtain at least a 5/10 in both subjects to pass the module. The final mark will be the average between both subjects. The assignment can be repeated in the second call; attendance cannot be retaken.

If the student passes just one of the units in the first call, the mark obtained will be bw carried over to the second call.

The teachers reserve the right to interview any student once the final assignment has been handed in.

If any plagiarism is detected, the overall mark will be a FAIL.
