También se ocupa de la teoría de las relaciones internacionales: delimitación del sistema internacional; aproximación teórica; actores internacionales; regulación del sistema; principios aplicables. En el campo de la economía política internacional se ocupa de su marco conceptual; globalización y política económica internacional; y panorama institucional en la economía global; sistema financiero y Fondo Monetario internacional; subdesarrollo y Banco Mundial.
